

I read this with my 9 year old for his summer reading assignment, he and I both enjoyed this book. The author is a great story teller keeping the personal experiences of the characters feel adventurous despite the fear and hopelessness that they lived through. Some of the racial discrimination and economic disparity described although truthful was a little hard for a 9 year old to digest. Definitely a kids book that needs some adult explanation and discussion while reading, some heavy moments that little minds may not be able to work out on their own.

Zane comes from the NE to visit his great grandmother and soon finds himself separated from her, and right in the midst of Hurricane Katrina. This non-stop adventure features a believable and lovable nearly thirteen-year-old boy. An elderly man and a young girl rescue him from the attic where he is about to drown. He learns a lot about a kind of life he has never before seen, and of how to survive in the worst that nature can throw at him. So well-written.
