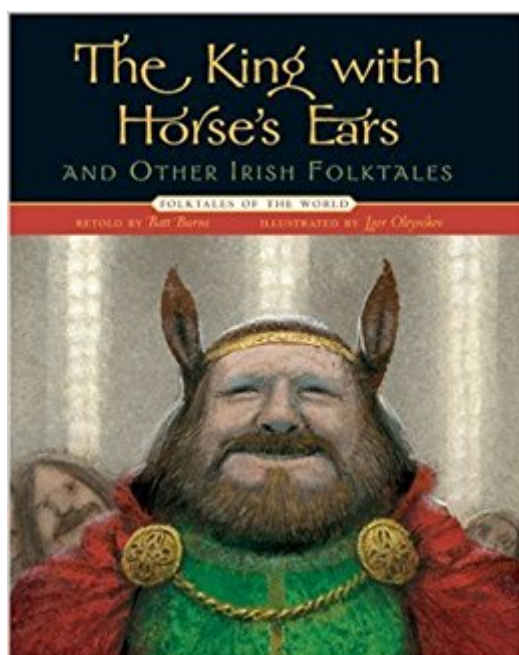

Grade 4 "This collection of folktales by a master storyteller will make readers feel as if they have stepped into an Irish country farmhouse for an evening of tales near the hearth. The 13 stories range from legends of warriors such as Cuchulainn and Fionn Mac Cumhail, to tales of leprechauns and pookas, to stories of resourceful farmers and demanding landlords. The selections range from 4

to 10 pages in length, and are suitable for reading aloud. Each story contains a smattering of Gaelic names and phrases; pronunciation guides are included as footnotes, and a glossary expands upon unfamiliar terminology. The author provides a note at the beginning of each story to set the scene, and in the back matter he cites sources for the tales. Oleynikov's gouache illustrations provide a fitting accompaniment to the lyrical yet wild tone of the stories, at times haunting and mysterious, at times rollicking and playful. These 13 Irish tales retold by storyteller Burns follow fairies and warriors, heroes and clever thieves. The oft-anthologized tale jostles alongside the lesser known in a collection that features Fionn Mac Cumhail, one of Ireland's most famous heroes, as well as Gadai Dubh, one of Ireland's most famous thieves. The stories are cleanly retold in contemporary, accessible language, and each is introduced with a short paragraph providing cultural or other information. A glossary offers a guide to the pronunciation of Gaelic words, and Gaelic names are given phonetic pronunciation within the tales themselves. Burns opens with an introduction explaining his storytelling upbringing and concludes with sources for his selected tales. Oleynikov's paintings have a rough texture that suits the energy of the retellings and adds to the lively tone. This is a hearty collection, handsomely produced with Celtic-knot borders and gouache full-page and spot illustrations. Readers (and potential storytellers) seeking humor and adventure would do well to begin here. Grades 3-6.

I'll say from the start, I can't say if this collection is true to Irish Folktales as told by Irish grandparents from memory. I'm not Irish. But after reading Batt Burns' retellings of these stories, I kind of wish I was. The stories are short enough to make for good bedtime story, but not so long that interest falters. There are pronunciation keys for the dialect words within the story, although I doubt I read them quite right. The stories, like any good folktales, come back with good morals about strengthening your family or helping your friends, and, generally, are uplifting. I found Igor Oleynikov's pictures really brought the stories to life. Especially in the tale of the Pooka, his illustration helps show a creature that is reasonably scary, but also fits with what the tale tells of the mythical creature. All in all, excellent stories to pass on, and a reasonable start to learning parts of Irish culture. I look forward to reading more from the Folktales of the World Series.

Some of the stories were hard to follow and seemed to be missing pieces. But overall it was a beautiful book!
